It covers hundreds of tips for making or improvising metalworking tools of all kinds: old pliers reground into a riveting tool for pin backs, chasing tools remounted as burnishers, old files shaped and ground into just about anything.Some tips are classics, like making small balls from fused jump rings, to ensure uniform amounts of metal in each one. Others deal with more modern things like flexible shaft tools. Not every tip will suit every worker or workshop. Amateurs, for example, might not have the high-volume needs or complex tooling of a professional shop. What really matters, though, is the attitude, the step from being a tool-user, however adept, to being a tool-maker. Even a flea-market drill bit can become a mandrel for forming tubes or for winding jump rings - and a set of bits gives fine control over the sizes of the products. If this book opens your eyes to new possibilities in old,

familiar tools and materials, it could change the way you work in fundamental ways.-- wiredweird
