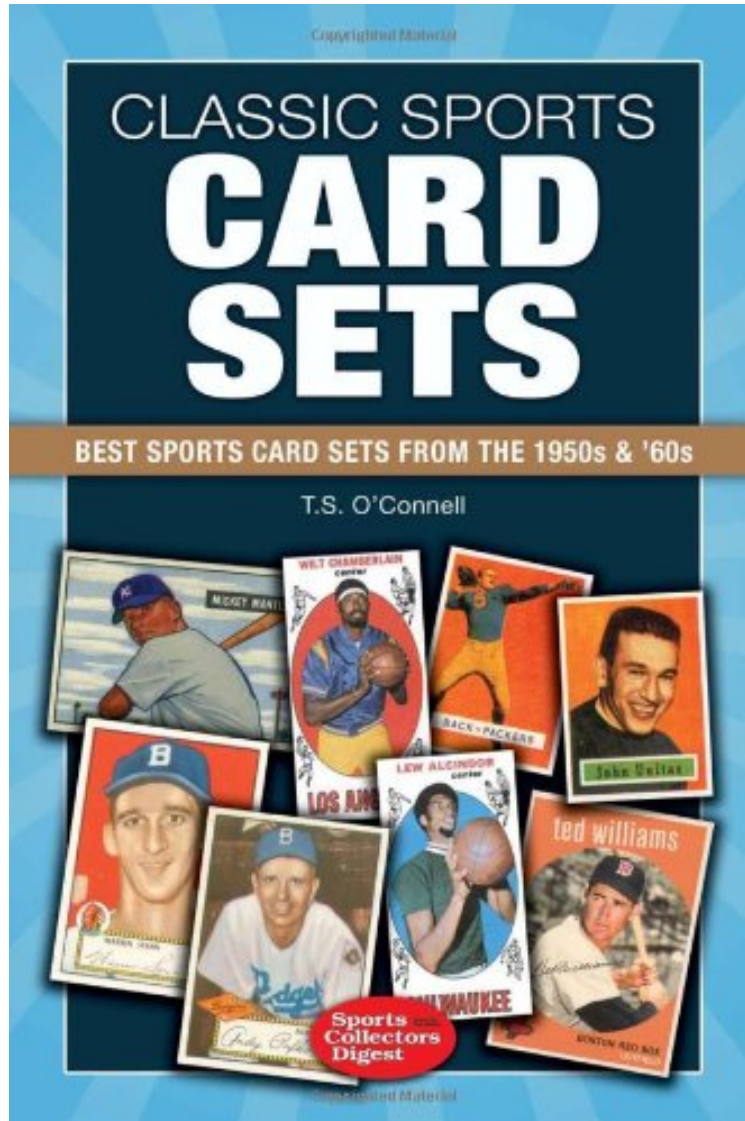

There were some interesting

comments about football sets but none on early Bowman football sets such as the classic 1951 set. As you guessed I am partial to the early Bowman sets but I am also a big fan of later Topps sets, such as 1956, 1959, 1961, 1967 and particularly the 1957 set, my favorite. The writer does praise the 1957 set extensively.
