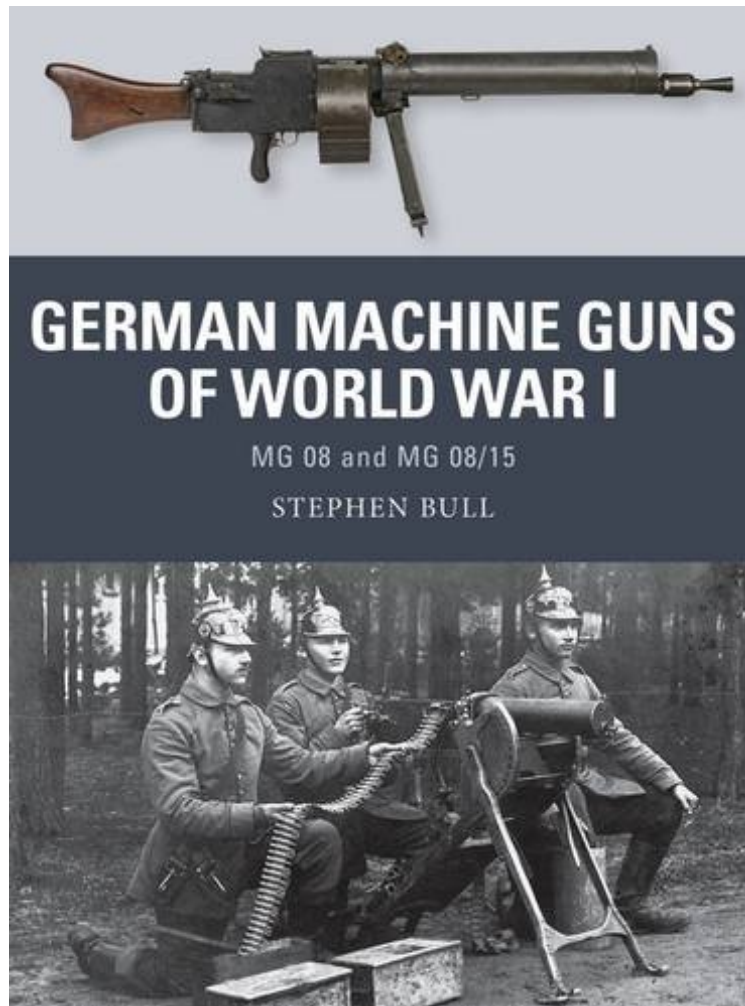

There is an extended technical discussion of its development, its teething problems as a new weapon, and its eventual fielding, which take up rather more than half the book. Its operational use is covered in the final chapters. The text is nicely supported with lots of period photographs, modern illustrations, and an excellent breakaway diagram of its internal workings.
