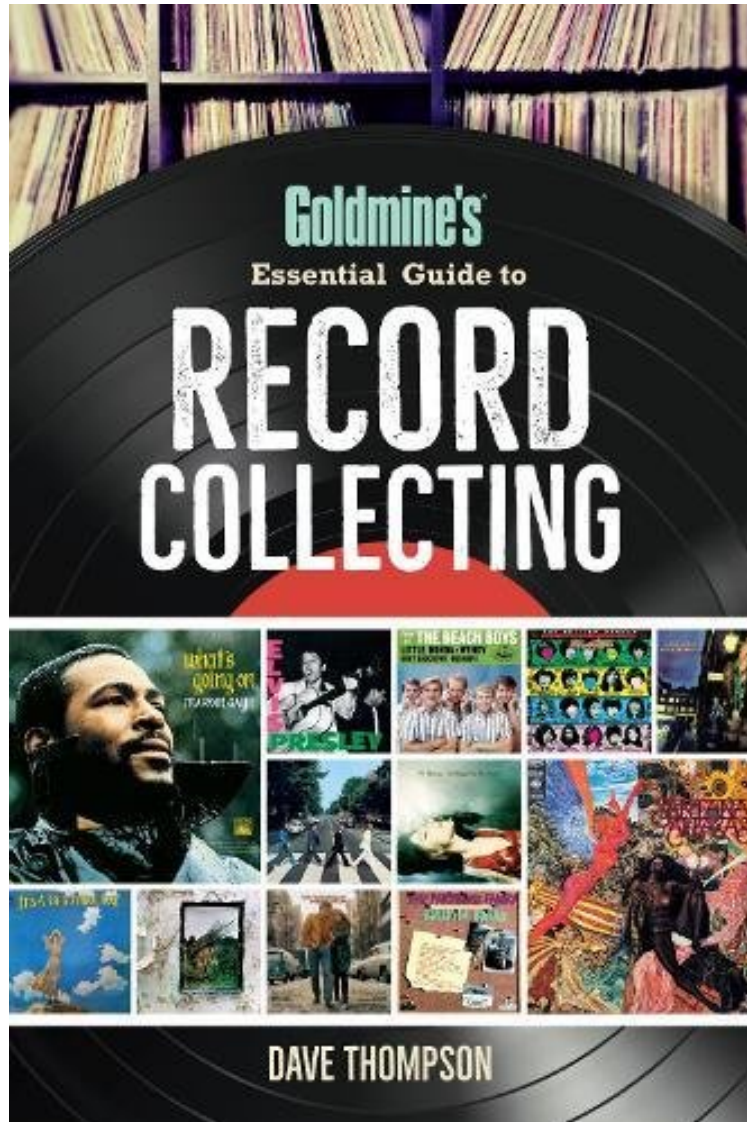

Thompson knows his stuff and it shows in his writing, which is insightful and can be a little bit snarky and breezy. The design and images are quite good. I'm a fan of old concert posters found throughout the book. I really enjoyed the chapter on The Birth of Rock 'n' Roll. The photos and writing were fun. In the chapter Thompson covers the heavyweights and then spends quite a bit of time on Gene Vincent, who I have to admit I had heard of but didn't know a lot about. Fascinating reading. The book is black and white, which I thought would make me like it less but just the opposite is true. The paper and design feel just right, giving the book a funky throwback vibe. The photograph of Dexter Gordon and the concert poster for Miles Davis alone make the Jazz chapter worth it. Nice job. Could have had more classic country: Johnny Cash, Hank Williams, etc. The book takes a pass on that genre, which is a shame.
