

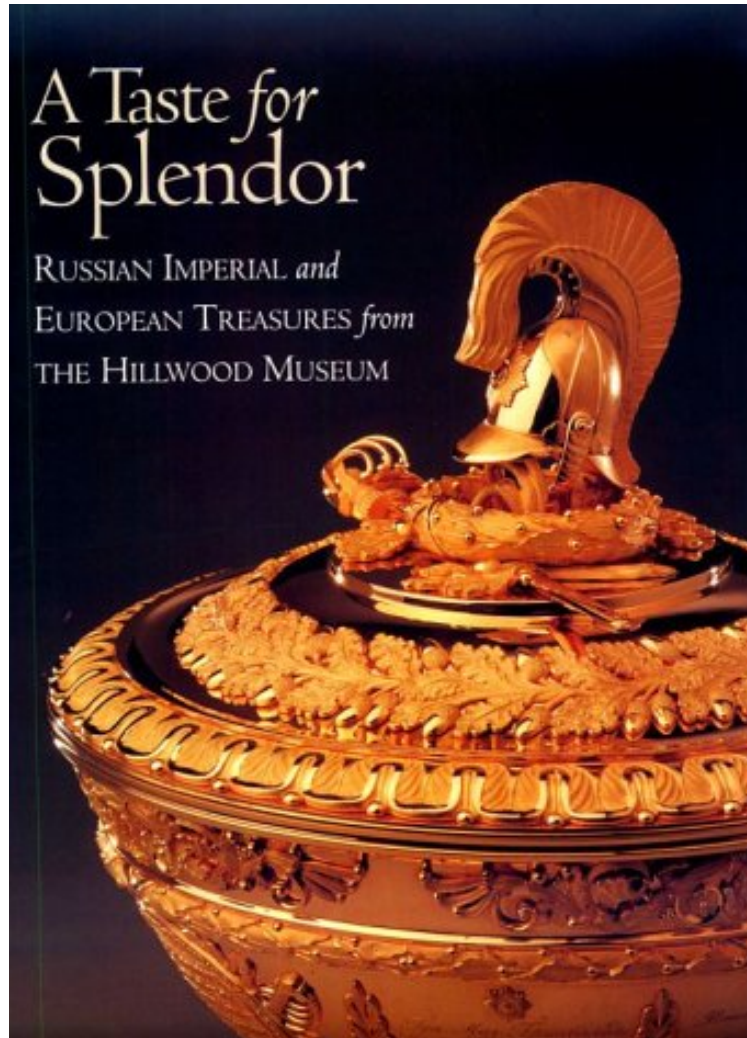

It is just a couple of blocks from the Zoo. During the 1920s she and her husband, EF Hutton, began acquiring 18th century French furniture and porcelain. In the 1930s she and her husband, Joseph Davies, began buying Romanov treasures from the Soviet government while he was the US ambassador to Moscow.The historical narrative is quick detailed. This book not only

shows some of the large elaborately furnished rooms, but lists with a color photograph all the extraordinary items in the estate- date of manufacture, by whom, dimensions, and its history. This is a cross section of decorative arts: tapestry, painted and jeweled boxes, paintings, porcelain, etched glasses, furniture, candelabra, gold works, jeweled objects, and a Faberge egg. There are one or two high resolution color photos per page, some taking up the entire page. The details are clear. Since photography is not allowed on the tour, this is the best souvenir you can get. Had you taken these photos, it would cost you more than the price of this book to get them developed. While MMP had been collecting art since her teens, she was also very fortunate to be at the right place at the right time { January 1937 June 1938 } as the wife of Ambassador Davies. She had influence and the ducats to purchase all manner of Russian Objects de Art for nominal prices, even pennies on the dollar. The Bolsheviks need for hard currency allied to their ignorance and disdain for much of the artistic treasures they possessed allowed MMP to purchase {and in the case of some of the Gold, Silver Religious pieces} and vestments} save them from their dismantling, dismemberment and destruction. MMP - Money, taste and luck a nice trifecta!! This is not a coffee table book of just great pictures. The narrative is an impressive achievement including chapters - a fairly extensive biography MMP, the selling and the destruction of Russian Art by the Bolsheviks, the origins of the Hillwood collection, how the European {especially French} artistic styles influenced Russian culture and artistic taste from the 18th thru 20th centuries all of which reflects how MMP built and what treasures are in the Hillwood collections. The photos are large, clear and of excellent quality. Each object has an extensive description of everything known about it. Icons, ceramics, liturgical vestments ,gold, jewelled and enamelled boxes and watches, chalices, pictures, furniture, clocks a treasure trove of wonderful things.
